Pre-planning most important

The funeral business is unique, one that Mike Ritchay, co-owner of Ritchay Funeral Home in Wisconsin Rapids

and Feldner-Ritchay Funeral Home in Nekoosa, is happy to talk about.

He shared information about pre-planning, funeral trusts, cremation and more at the Alzheimer's Caregiver Support Group meeting in June.


Pre-planning -- which is not pre-paying and doesn't cost anything more than your time

-- is easier for you, your spouse and your family members. Figuring out what sort of funeral you want, writing it down and sharing that information with your family members and funeral home will make things easier. Rather than guessing at what a person wanted, it's better to have a plan to follow. It takes the pressure off family members, Ritchay said.

"You assume your kids know" what you want, Ritchay said. "They don't. You'd be surprised."

Pre-planning is important for everyone. In the case of caregivers, it's possible the caregiver could die before the person with the illness. Someone with Alzheimer's disease or dementia would not be able to help plan a funeral.

People don't want to think about dying, but it will happen to everyone. Often people will be relieved once they begin the planning process, Ritchay said.



My Personal Wiskes funeral expenses. The informational part is all of the details, such as: Will you be buried or cremated? Will you have a church service? Who will give the eulogy? Do you have a flower preference? What do you want in your obituary?

A funeral trust is an irrevocable financial trust, usually an interestbearing CD, which can only be used for specific funeral expenses.

No one can use that money for any other purpose.

Your funeral director will help you determine the cost of your funeral. You can set aside an approximate amount, but it's impossible to determine all of the costs up front. Flowers, food and even a burial plot can go up in price, Ritchay said.

Family dynamics have changed through the years. Second marriages, far-flung families and discord among family members can make planning a funeral challenging, Ritchay said. People today aren't as connected to churches as they once were. Decades ago, every funeral was similar and people wanted them to be that way. Now a funeral can be as unique as you are.

Becky's breakfast pastry recipe



Fresh breakfast for seniors made by Becky at Hilltop Affiliates. Fresh blueberries, strawberries, oranges, peaches, bananas and cottage cheese with a German sour cream twist.

Hilltop cook Becky made a German pastry recently for breakfast. Pair it with fresh fruit and cottage cheese for a delicious meal. The recipe follows.

Recipe for German Sour Cream Twist **Ingredients**

3½ cups sifted special for bread flour

1 tsp. salt

1 cup shortening (part butter)

1 pkg. active dry yeast

1/4 cup warm water

3/4 cup thick sour cream

1 whole egg and 2 egg yolks, well beaten

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup sugar

Directions

Sift flour, salt into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening. Dissolve yeast in water. Stir into flour mixture with sour cream, eggs, vanilla. Mix well with hand. Cover with damp cloth and refrigerate 2 hours. Roll half of dough on sugared board into an oblong, 8 inches by 16 inches. Fold

ends toward center, ends overlapping. Sprinkle with sugar, roll again to same size. Repeat a third time. Roll about a quarter-inch thick. Cut into strips 1 inch by 4 inches. Twist ends in opposite directions -- stretching dough slightly. Put in shape of horseshoe, if desired. Repeat with rest of dough.

Heat oven to 375 degrees.

Bake about 15 minutes or until delicately browned. Take from baking sheet immediately. Makes about 5 dozen.

On July 2, 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed into the law the historic Civil Rights Act in a nationally televised ceremony. Hundreds of guests were invited to the ceremony at the White House. Johnson used more than 75 pens to sign the bill, then gave them away as mementoes of the occasion, according to tradition. One went to Martin Luther King, who called it one of his most cherished possessions.

The Civil Rights Act prohibited racial discrimination in employment and education and outlawed racial segregation in public places.
